

THE PHENOMENON OF EPONYMY IN THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE
FROM THE FILM INDUSTRY

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Abstract. The phenomenon of eponymy, where a word or phrase is derived from a proper noun, plays a significant role in shaping language and popular culture. This article explores the concept of eponyms, particularly in the context of the film industry, and how iconic characters, situations, or concepts from movies become integrated into the English language. An eponym is a word or phrase derived from a proper noun, typically referencing a person, place, or thing that the proper noun represents. The Greek origin of the word "eponym," meaning "given as a name," reflects the essence of how these terms evolve. [5] Eponyms are ubiquitous in the English language, with approximately 35,000 such

words currently in use. The film industry, in particular, has contributed numerous eponyms to modern vocabulary, where characters or situations from iconic films become shorthand for specific traits or behaviors. If we talk about eponyms in language and culture, we can say that eponyms, especially those from films, hold significant cultural importance. They often emerge from characters or stories that have made lasting impressions on audiences, transcending their original cinematic context and becoming symbols for broader social, emotional, or psychological concepts. The widespread recognition of these characters and their associated behaviors leads to their names being used to describe similar traits in real-life situations.

For example, the term “*Frankenstein*” (from *Frankenstein*, 1931) is widely associated with the monster itself, despite the name originally referring to the scientist, Dr. Victor Frankenstein. Over time, the name “*Frankenstein*” has become synonymous with creatures or individuals that are seen as creations or experiments gone awry. This cultural shift in meaning illustrates how eponyms evolve beyond their original narrative, becoming shorthand for particular societal ideas or fears.

Below we can observe several number of prominent examples of eponyms from the film industry:

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| 1 | <p>Frankenstein (from <i>Frankenstein</i>, 1931) <i>Eponym: Frankenstein’s Monster</i> (often mistakenly referred to as “Frankenstein”) <i>Origin:</i> From Mary Shelley’s novel, popularized by the 1931 film adaptation. <i>Cultural Impact:</i> “<i>Frankenstein</i>” now refers to a creature created through unnatural means or a monstrous creation. | 2 | <p>The Cyrano (from <i>Cyrano de Bergerac</i>, 1950) <i>Eponym: Cyrano</i> <i>Origin:</i> From Edmond Rostand’s play and subsequent film adaptations. <i>Cultural Impact:</i> Refers to someone with great intelligence or wit but lacking physical attractiveness, often used to describe a person who assists others in romantic pursuits.</p> |
| 3 | <p>Hannibal Lecter (from <i>The Silence of the Lambs</i>, 1991) <i>Eponym: Hannibal Lecter</i> <i>Origin:</i> The chilling, intelligent villain became associated with psychopathy and intellectual manipulation. <i>Cultural Impact:</i> A “<i>Hannibal Lecter</i>” now symbolizes an intelligent but terrifying figure, often used in discussions of criminal psychology.[3;12]</p> |
| 4 | <p>Maverick (from <i>Top Gun</i>, 1986) <i>Eponym: Maverick</i></p> |

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| | <p><i>Origin:</i> Pete “Maverick” Mitchell, played by Tom Cruise, epitomized a rebellious, independent hero.</p> <p><i>Cultural Impact:</i> “Maverick” is used to describe someone who does not conform to traditional rules, symbolizing risk-taking and independence. | 5 | <p>Bond Girl (from <i>James Bond</i> films)</p> <p><i>Eponym:</i> Bond Girl</p> <p><i>Origin:</i> The glamorous and seductive female characters associated with James Bond.</p> <p><i>Cultural Impact:</i> “Bond Girl” became a cultural shorthand for a glamorous, strong female character in spy or action films. | 6 | <p>MacGyver (from <i>MacGyver</i> TV series, 1985–1992)</p> <p><i>Eponym:</i> MacGyver</p> <p><i>Origin:</i> The protagonist, known for solving complex problems using simple materials.</p> <p><i>Cultural Impact:</i> “MacGyver” has become a verb, used to describe the act of improvising a solution with limited resources. | 7 | <p>Rocky (from <i>Rocky</i>, 1976)</p> <p><i>Eponym:</i> Rocky</p> <p><i>Origin:</i> Sylvester Stallone’s portrayal of an underdog boxer became an enduring symbol of perseverance.</p> <p><i>Cultural Impact:</i> The name “Rocky” symbolizes the struggle to overcome obstacles, especially in the context of personal or professional challenges.</p> |
