The language's grammatical structure has simplified over time; for example, modern English has largely lost the gender and case agreement exhibited in Old English.

**Lexicon and Borrowings:** English vocabulary is notably vast and diverse, with an extensive array of borrowings from Latin, French, Norse, and other languages. This has resulted in a rich lexicon that can express nuanced differences in meaning.

Evolution of the English Language:
